Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria – Annual Report 2015-2016



After many years of volunteering myself, I continue to be surprised by the passion, commitment and resilience of CFA volunteers. On behalf of the Board, I appreciate and welcome your views, comments and support to encourage, maintain and strengthen emergency service volunteering in Victoria. I would like to thank all volunteers for their passion and for selflessly giving up their time to protect and support their community.

As an organisation built to be the voice of CFA volunteers, VFBV has grown and become more sophisticated in its role, and it has done that with the great support of Brigades. This has been particularly

important, as we have had a challenging year, on and off the fireground. Even through these tough times, volunteers have continued to deliver services to Victoria's communities.

VFBV's office bearers all come from brigades and having taken up the role of State President this year, I am in the fortunate position of working to build on the achievements of those who have gone before me. Among them are VFBV's inaugural President Gary Lyttle AFSM and another member of its first Board, Tom Brodie AFSM, who both retired from the Board this year. I would like to personally recognise the exceptional skill level of both Andrew and Adam in their handling and management of the extreme workload regarding the ongoing issues impacting on volunteers in CFA. We are fortunate to have such a great team of people working for us.

And finally, I would like to thank Board, State and District Council members – they are the faces of VFBV at the local level, and in turn give volume and credibility to the voice of the Brigades and volunteers they represent.

### Nev Jones, AFSM



This has been a tough year, when VFBV needed to step up and strongly represent CFA volunteers. I am enormously proud of the way VFBV has performed and approached this challenge.

Over recent years we have progressively developed our networks, our links to members, our profile and a respect for our voice. This year, that voice was

called on, and I believe we delivered it strongly, respectfully, diligently, truthfully and powerfully.

This voice is the culmination of our whole organisation's effort and commitment. To every VFBV delegate, our members and staff, and the network of supporters who work with or listen to us, thank you.

This association has represented volunteers at state level, and worked diligently at the local level to resolve issues in partnership with District Councils and brigades. We can point to leadership training, raising the profile of volunteer issues, our continued campaign for presumptive legislation, strong input to the Fiskville Inquiry and Fire Service Review, the great work of our support officers in the field, VESEP grants and the much greater involvement of women and younger volunteers, as great achievements that directly benefit brigades.

For much of the second half of the year, we have all been busy seeking to preserve and protect the volunteer based and fully integrated nature of CFA, an enormous additional challenge, workload and commitment.

I want to thank the State Council, our 21 District Councils, the committees and working groups, brigades, Groups, our elected delegates and the local volunteer leaders who have taken the initiative, encouraged and supported us with the great things they have under way. I also want to acknowledge and thank the VFBV Board for their focus on shaping the future for CFA, VFBV and our members, and a great source of sound direction, advice and perspective.

In particular, I am proud of these key achievements:

- Another record number of Brigades affiliating with VFBV the 93% of brigades affiliated this year is a strong show of support
- VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey record numbers taking part and the groundwork for expansion to more agencies and interstate volunteers
- VFBV Volunteer Leadership Program with another 55 graduates this year, another investment in the future of volunteerism and the emergency services
- VFBV's work to build public awareness of the professionalism and essential nature of CFA volunteers this year included an innovative animated video, and a computer generated time lapse video using evidence based modelling, both demonstrating the value of CFA's great volunteer surge capacity
- Emergency Management Volunteer Statement a document that complements and strengthens the CFA Volunteer Charter through a commitment from State Government to all EM volunteers
- VESEP grants support to brigades with case studies and practical help from the VFBV Support Officers
- Supporting the growth and development of the Council of Australian Volunteer Fire Associations (CAVFA) – an arena for the raising of national issues
- VFBV Multi-Agency Youth Network giving younger volunteers a greater voice now, and building their capabilities as the next generation of leaders
- Digital Scanners the result of a VFBV survey in 2010, this year brigades received thousands of subsidised digital scanners to keep them informed after the shutdown of analogue radio channels
- Delegate Development Program building the skills of Brigade Delegates and their capabilities as leaders
- The continuing good work of the VFBV Volunteer Welfare Fund

   helping 37 volunteers this year
- Assistance to volunteers affected by the year's major fires support in accessing government assistance, and financial grants from the Black Saturday Volunteer Recovery fund to volunteers who lost their homes

- Major representation work on issues including:
  - The Fire Services Review including a detailed submission and presentation to the Parliamentary Committee
  - The Fiskville Inquiry stressing the safety of our members and support to any who have been exposed; VFBV's submission and presentations to the Inquiry calling for expert, independent transparent and accountable analysis of decisions; and calling for urgent replacement of Fiskville's vital training capacity.
  - Presumptive legislation continuing to engage with Members of Parliament, supporting brigades raising the issue locally, and addressing a Parliamentary Inquiry that led to career and volunteer firefighters being treated equally under Queensland's new legislation

VFBV's work continues with volunteer concerns to ensure CFA industrial agreements and workforce arrangements contribute positively to sustaining a strong volunteer based and fully integrated CFA model. We have campaigned to ensure that industrial agreements do not override the Chief Officer's powers, or interfere with CFA's ability to: engage or deploy volunteers; provide support or equipment to volunteers; or manage its operations in relation to volunteers.

CFA has faced significant change, and volunteers thank the former Minister for Emergency Services Jane Garrett, CFA Chair Claire Higgins, the former CFA Board, CFA CEO Lucinda Nolan, and Chief Officers Euan Ferguson and his successor Joe Buffone for their hard work and support for volunteers.

And finally, I would like to personally thank the VFBV Board Members, State Councillors, District Council members, Brigade Delegates, and the individual volunteers who have contributed on committees, in consultation and local resolution of a huge range of issues. Thanks also to all VFBV staff members, most of whom are also CFA volunteers, for their hard work, commitment and willingness to take on a range of issues that affect not only local brigades but issues that impact statewide and nationally.

VFBV has, more than ever, been doing its job of working for Strong Volunteerism, Embraced to Build Community Resilience for a Safer Victoria, and you have all been a part of that great vision.

Andrew Ford Chief Executive Officer It has been an eventful year, with a long and busy summer season with significant community impact, VFBV's work with the Fire Services Review, the Fiskville Inquiry and a Queensland Parliamentary Inquiry into firefighters cancer law, the formation of a new CFA District and VFBV District Council, the distribution of thousands of subsidised digital scanners to brigades, VESEP grants and innovative new work to promote the professionalism and contribution of CFA volunteers.

An early start to the 2015/16 fire season brought fires including: Lancefield – 4,000 hectares Strathdownie peat fire Somerton tip fire Scotsburn – 4,600 hectares Wye River – 2,500 hectares

While Victoria lost 148 homes to bushfires, CFA volunteers went to South Australia to fight the 80,000 hectare Adelaide Hills fires and to Tasmania to assist with fires that burnt 100,000 hectares – another example of the vital importance of CFA's volunteer surge capacity.

It was identified through VFBV's 2010 Scanner and Listening Set Stocktake that volunteers were using thousands of analogue machines that would become redundant when CFA moved to digital radio. With significant input from volunteers, in August this year a digital scanner was chosen for CFA. Funding through VESEP and CFA provided a subsidy for 10,000 scanners for brigades and Groups.

VFBV and the volunteer network were involved at every stage and provided a good example of how to bring in new technology.

Results from the 2014 VFBV Volunteer Welfare and Efficiency Survey once again demonstrated the value of the annual survey, with record participation. The final report went to the Minister for Emergency Services, the Emergency Management Commissioner and CFA, and became part of the development of the CFA Red Paper as an evidence base to shape the future of the CFA.

VFBV and volunteers provided extensive input to the State Government's draft Emergency Management Volunteer Statement for Victoria. In discussions with VFBV, the Minister and Emergency Management Commissioner assured that the Statement is intended to strengthen and complement the CFA Volunteer Charter.

Promoting the professionalism and essential nature of volunteers to Victoria's emergency services, VFBV launched a simple animated video showing how CFA's huge volunteer capacity deals with multiple major incidents, anywhere in the state at any time.

VFBV then engaged with the University of Melbourne's Centre for Disaster Management and Public Safety to develop a tool to put CFA response data into visual form. Using computer generated time lapse video of a map of Victoria, it demonstrates how crews from multiple brigades deploy to major incidents anywhere in the state, how large numbers of firefighters are drawn from the Greater Melbourne Area, and how the number of days requiring more than 250 CFA trucks in the field has doubled since 2001.

The two videos have achieved tens of thousands of views online, and are in use by VFBV delegates around the state.

VFBV provided practical support to Brigades applying for Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) grants for new emergency vehicles, equipment and fire station improvements, and the State Government announced \$7.1 million for the successful 202 CFA brigades.

VFBV's inaugural President Gary Lyttle AFSM and Board Member Tom Brodie AFSM retired from the Board, succeeded by Jill Parker and Samantha Rothman, the Board's first female members. Hans van Hamond AFSM retired from the role of State President after five successful years, succeeded by Nev Jones AFSM.

District 27 was established in the wake of the Hazelwood Mine Fire, and the VFBV District 27 Council held its first meetings early in 2016.

VFBV provided a submission and evidence to the Parliamentary Inquiry into the Fiskville Training College, stressing the paramount importance of the safety of our members and ongoing support to anyone who had been exposed, and calling for expert, independent transparent and accountable analysis of the facts involved with the Fiskville issue, and how to fix the issue for the future.

VFBV's work to protect volunteers and CFA from industrial interference gave rise to unprecedented public activities involving thousands of volunteers around the state, and a commitment to changed Federal Legislation, making it objectionable for workplace agreements to restrict or limit the emergency organisation's ability to:

- engage or deploy its volunteers;
- provide support or equipment to those volunteers;
- manage its relationship with, or work with, any recognised emergency management body in relation to those volunteers;
- otherwise manage its operations in relation to those volunteers.

Another representation task was the State Government's Fire Services Review, for which VFBV provided a formal submission, briefings and practical assistance. A key theme of the review was recognition of the enormous front line and collective capacity of Victoria's fire services, and the need to ensure there is a culture of cooperation and collective respect.

VFBV gave evidence to a Parliamentary Inquiry that led to Queensland passing presumptive legislation to give paid and volunteer firefighters equal access to fairer cancer compensation rights. Volunteers were approaching Victorian MPs to sign a pledge to support Victorian legislation to meet that same standard, and Western Australia introduced legislation to cover its volunteer firefighters. VFBV continues to press for equal coverage for all Victorian firefighters.

In December, another 55 volunteers graduated from the VFBV Volunteer Leadership Scholarship Program, making it more than 230 who have graduated since 2010. The volunteers from CFA and five other emergency service agencies achieved the nationally recognised Certificate IV in Frontline Management.


Throughout the year, CFA Brigades responded to 40,000 emergency incidents and 82,000 turnouts, protecting 3.3 million Victorians, 60% of suburban Melbourne, regional cities and all of country Victoria.

### VFBV MEMBERSHIP CONTINUES AT ALL-TIME HIGH

Volunteer support for their association continues at historically high levels. A slightly higher number of Brigades chose to affiliate with VFBV in 2015-16, setting a new record and maintaining the overall 93% affiliation first achieved in the previous year.

Districts 13, 14, 22, 23, 24 and 27 achieved 100% Brigade affiliation, and 12 Districts were at 95% affiliation or higher.

The continued strong support from Brigades is being attributed to the hard work and good local representation of District Councils, Brigade Delegates and State Council delegates; practical projects like the VFBV Volunteer Leadership Scholarships program, the VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey, the partnership with CFA that provided thousands of subsidised digital scanners, the VFBV representation that gained commitments from successive State Governments to additional new fire trucks worth \$60 million; and the affiliation related benefits of additional involvement in VFBV forums and decisions, and eligibility for the VFBV Volunteer Welfare Fund.



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
### **VOLUNTEER WELFARE FUND - MOST BRIGADES ARE MEMBERS**

Brigade membership of the VFBV Volunteer Welfare Fund has risen to another record high, with 1,062 Brigades subscribing this year, compared with fewer than 600 seven years ago.

In 2015/2016 the Welfare Fund distributed \$133,348 to 37 volunteers experiencing financial hardship.

Over more than a century, the Fund has helped close to 1,100 volunteers, distributing over \$1.4 million in grants. It offers small grants to CFA volunteers, long serving former volunteers and their families, who are experiencing significant financial hardship. Typical cases involve prolonged illness, bereavement, loss of earnings, or the accommodation and travel costs associated with supporting a relative in hospital.

The Welfare Fund is run under Australian Tax Office rules, independently audited, uses only State Government approved investments, and the welfare grant and investment decisions are made by a committee of long serving CFA volunteers. To subscribe to the Welfare Fund, Brigades must be affiliated with VFBV, which covers the operating costs so that any money the Fund receives is used entirely to help volunteers in need.



VFBV's day to day work is based on volunteer involvement at every level and an association structure that supports both major projects and the raising and resolving of issues from the local to the statewide arena.

Volunteers can raise issues or ideas through a VFBV network that starts with their own Brigade and includes their District Council, the specialist VFBV/CFA Joint Committees, VFBV State Council, and a variety of specialist working parties, and works with CFA at every level to enable solutions in the shortest possible time.

Here are some examples of the projects and issues receiving attention during the year:

### **Digital Scanners**

During the year, a cooperative VFBV/CFA project delivered 10,000 VESEP/CFA subsidised digital scanners to Brigades, with an equitable distribution system guaranteeing every Brigade up to eight subsidised units, and the option of more at a price hundreds of dollars below retail.

The work started in 2010, with VFBV's Scanner and Listening Set Stocktake, which revealed that Brigades and volunteers were using thousands of analogue units that would become redundant when CFA moved to digital dispatch.



VFBV worked with CFA on the subsidy scheme, applying for VESEP funding and managing brigades' applications, as well as ensuring units were extensively field tested by volunteers.

The project resolved a significant problem affecting every Brigade, and demonstrated the great value of involving VFBV representatives and volunteers in the field, in the selection, testing and introduction of new equipment.

# Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP)

Every year, VFBV supports Brigades applying for VESEP grants, with a detailed Application Help Pack, simple case studies that show how successful applications have worked in past years, and direct advice and encouragement from VFBV State Councillors and VFBV Support Officers.

VFBV worked with the State Government on the original design of the program, which is low on paperwork and lets brigades choose the equipment or projects that suit their community needs and fundraising capabilities. Fundraising is required because VESEP grants top up locally raised funds on a \$2 for \$1 basis.

This financial year, VESEP provided grants totalling \$7.1 million to 202 CFA brigades, funding new emergency vehicles, equipment and fire station improvements.

In addition, there was \$1.9 million for initiatives such as cold climate gear for volunteers attending callouts in inclement weather.

### Over 65s Income Protection

During the year, VFBV successfully supported a volunteer over the age of 65 who was denied loss of income compensation after a fireground accident.

The volunteer's claim was initially rejected under an interpretation of CFA regulations because he was deemed to be of retirement age.

The volunteer's local VFBV District Council and the VFBV Executive took up the volunteer's case and CFA reversed its decision, providing full compensation.

Representation brought about co-operation; CFA recognised that this matter is very important to volunteers and agreed to VFBV's request to work on legislative changes that ensure the situation is not repeated; a reassuring move for all volunteers who contribute to their community past 65.

VFBV has requested that the legislation changes be based on Western Australia's recent changes, which removed all reference to retirement ages from their workers' and volunteer compensation legislation.

### First Aid and Medical Qualifications

The VFBV/CFA Joint Training Committee, has moved towards a solution to ensure recognition of existing first aid skills of volunteers who are medical practitioners, paramedics and nurses.

The Committee was this year advised that CFA proposes the creation of a new CFA competency that will be used to record those members who have evidence of formal and current qualifications and will satisfy the CFA skills profile requirements for first aid for those members.

The need for recognition of prior learning has been part of a wider issue for some time, including limits on the number of volunteers being trained in First Aid. Those limits have persisted in spite of the Chief Officer's 'maximum density model' and assurances that a funding proposal was close to being accepted.

VFBV continues to work with CFA towards the removal of barriers to First Aid training, Recognition of Prior Learning, and First Aid training to be made available for every operational volunteer willing to undertake it and non-operational volunteers who need it under OH&S requirements.

### **Cold Climate Jackets**

This year's VESEP Grants from the State Government included \$1.9 million for initiatives including cold climate gear for volunteers attending callouts like road accidents and searches in inclement weather.

The funding was achieved through a successful joint CFA/VFBV State Initiative. The VFBV/CFA Joint Equipment & Infrastructure Committee endorsed

specifications for the Cold Climate Jackets after field testing by volunteers who improved the design.

The evaluation included four jackets sent to each District, and the feedback received from the volunteers who put them to practical use was overwhelmingly positive.

### Volunteer Input on Pumpers and Tankers

The successful roadshow format advocated by VFBV when the current Medium Tanker was being developed has been further refined this year, with the prototype Heavy Tanker completing its tour and the Medium Pumper going into production.

The roadshow takes each prototype around the state, allowing thousands of volunteers and staff to get their hands on the next

generation vehicles, ask questions and make suggestions and requests.

The VFBV/CFA Joint Equipment Committee found volunteers' comments and



requests led to a number of improvements to the equipment/ stowage layout of the Heavy Tanker.

### **BOV Insurance**

Early in the year, the strong advocacy of VFBV delegates and their cooperative work with CFA paid off, with arrangements to upgrade the insurance on Brigade Owned Vehicles (BOVs). This means that brigades will no longer be left out of pocket if a vehicle is written off.

The issue was first highlighted by VFBV following an incident in 2013, and has been a sensitive issue, especially when vehicles were damaged during operational deployment elsewhere in the state, leaving the Brigade having to pay the gap between the vehicle's pre-accident value and the actual replacement cost.

CFA approved VFBV's call for the establishment of an annual budget provision to cover any gap, and new for old replacement of vehicles within 24 months of their registration.

### Welfare and Disaster Support

In addition to the work of the VFBV Volunteer Welfare Fund, VFBV delegates, officials and Board Members were hard at work In the wake of the major fires of the 2015/16 summer, meeting with brigades in the affected areas and conducting welfare checks on individual volunteers.

VFBV also assisted with information and support in accessing government support services for people affected by bushfires and other natural disasters on the VFBV website and provided it to VFBV officials in each District.

VFBV's support for volunteers in need also includes the work of the VFBV Black Saturday Volunteer Recovery Fund, providing one-off financial grants to volunteers who had lost their homes.

### Training Issues

During the year, the VFBV/CFA Joint Training Committee oversaw the introduction of materials for improved structural firefighting training.

The new program consists of 11 sessions and can be delivered all in one block or as seven separate sections to provide greater flexibility to meet the needs of volunteers.

On another front, the Joint Committee raised concerns at the lack of computer aided simulation training offered to volunteers, and requested that CFA develop a proactive delivery plan and budget to provide brigades with greater access to this popular and flexible training option.

CFA agreed to a VFBV/CFA Joint Operations Committee request to rework the Sector Commander course to remove duplication of elements that are already in other courses and reduce the time commitment required. The course has been broken into four distinct modules with any duplication removed, a move expected to reduce the time commitment required from volunteers.

### Resolving Conflicts in Brigades

VFBV this year added to its familiar work of supporting brigades to resolve internal issues at the local level, by developing a simple handbook for delegates on resolving conflicts within brigades.

VFBV was directly involved in the successful resolution of more than a dozen conflict cases that arose during the year, and the handbook is an additional option that will go a long way to finding prompt and mutually respectful outcomes for volunteers.

The handbook has been designed by volunteers for volunteers, as a helpful tool and an easy-to-read guide to assist delegates in helping Captains and volunteers to achieve timely resolutions to conflicts, including bullying, discrimination or harassment issues.

It has now gone to a final volunteer feedback round, and will be finalised early in the next financial year.

### **CFA Memorial**

CFA consulted families who have lost loved ones about the future of the Fiskville Memorial, and VFBV has called for the opinions of volunteers at large to be considered, stressing that it is more than just a question of where to move the memorial wall.

### Further examples

As a guide to the huge variety of issues handled every year by VFBV's representatives on Joint VFBV/CFA Committees and working groups, brigades and individual volunteers, here are some additional examples from the past 12 months:

- The recognition of junior services as part of a member's overall service record
- Ultralight/slip on crew protection systems
- Low voltage fuse removal qualifications
- Proposals for a zero blood alcohol requirement for Code One driving

### VFBV Leadership Scholarships

Another 55 volunteers graduated from the VFBV Volunteer Leadership Scholarship Program this year, taking the total to more than 230 who have graduated since 2010.

VFBV has expanded the program to serve the wider Emergency Management sector, and this year volunteers from CFA, Ambulance Victoria, Lifesaving Victoria, the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard, St John Ambulance and VICSES achieved the nationally recognised Certificate IV in Frontline Management, delivered for VFBV by Chisholm TAFE.



The program is designed to suit the study needs of volunteers and the qualification will help them in their day to day employment as well as their work as emergency volunteers, their day to day careers and their contributions to the community for years to come.

The program is funded by VFBV, with assistance over the years from generous donors such as international racehorse breeding organisation Darley, the Herald Sun and the Victoria Racing Club. In recent years, the program has received top up funding and support from the Victorian Government through the Valuing Volunteers Program.


### VFBV Multi-Agency Youth Network

VFBV has made great progress in establishing a formal youth network involving young volunteers from across the emergency services sector this year, with the aim of giving younger volunteers greater input to decision making in VFBV, CFA and

the broader Emergency Management Sector.

Many young volunteers from CFA and other agencies have joined to contribute their ideas and build their skills, as leaders of the future.

On the back of a very successful CFA Youth



They are supported by experienced senior volunteers who as Champions, guide them in their projects and provide them with knowledge and experience of VFBV, CFA and the sector as a whole.

### VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey

The annual VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey took significant steps forward this year, with the successful launch of the new VICSES version, and the groundwork in place to take the next survey to more Victorian agencies and volunteer firefighters nationwide.

The 2015 survey attracted more than 2,500 volunteers taking part, with their responses to be analysed for a survey report going to VFBV and CFA Boards, CFA's senior management, VICSES, the Emergency Management Commissioner and the Minister for Emergency Services.

As the year drew to a close, the 2016 survey was about to open with VFBV hosting a nationwide version for the Council of Australian Volunteer Fire Associations (CAVFA) and tailored versions for Victorian emergency volunteers with Ambulance Victoria, St John Ambulance, the Australian Red Cross, Life Saving Victoria, the Salvation Army and the Victorian Council of Churches Emergencies Ministry.

### Emergency Medical Response (EMR)

With the State Government announcing additional funding to expand Emergency Medical Response (EMR) by CFA brigades, VFBV sought confirmation from CFA and the Emergency Management Commissioner that both volunteers and paid firefighters will be providing the service.

Five volunteer brigades have already successfully provided EMR for years under the pilot program, and saved a significant number of lives in the process. VFBV is encouraging brigades in communities that need EMR, and who have the willingness and the capacity to provide this important community service, to be working with VFBV to pursue support to enable its implementation in their brigade area.

We have encouraged brigades to have the conversation among their volunteers, talk to their community about the issues and the benefits, and discuss possible support for the program with community leaders.

### Fire Services Review

VFBV put considerable work into ensuring the State Government's Fire Services Review had access to sufficient information and the advice and opinions of the volunteers at the front line. VFBV was supportive of the Review's findings and the Government's response to the recommendations.

The Government's proposed actions were based on building a culture of co-operation and respect, and a very strong theme throughout the Review's report was the need for the skills, expertise and professionalism of volunteers and paid staff alike to be recognised and respected equally, regardless of their pay status.

VFBV's submission addressed the importance of CFA's integrated model, interoperability between agencies, and the absolute necessity of encouraging, maintaining and strengthening the volunteer resource that gives CFA its large scale surge capacity.

VFBV saw the Victorian Government's response to the report as a road map, and the invitation for much closer collective effort and strong constructive relationships gave us the optimism that some real improvements can be made. For the issues requiring more work, VFBV looks forward to working with Government, the agencies and other stakeholders.

### Fiskville Training College

VFBV has been active in stressing the importance of the safety of our members, and the need for proper support to any who have been exposed at the Fiskville site.

During CFA's efforts to remediate the site, VFBV campaigned for transparent, expert and independent monitoring and easier access to information, including the posting of regular water testing results online.

VFBV made submission and provided evidence to the Parliamentary Inquiry into Fiskville, calling for expert, independent, transparent and accountable analysis of decisions, and providing the facts and figures to demonstrate the need for urgent replacement of Fiskville's vital training capacity.

VFBV continued to press for the introduction of sufficient facilities to fill the gap in CFA's state-level capacity, along with appropriate facilities for the Brigades that previously used Fiskville as their regional training base.

### **Delegate Development**

Following on from our successful District Council Executive Workshops, VFBV this year developed the pilot of a formal competency course for Brigade Delegates, designed to equip them with skills that will help to increase the level of engagement between District Councils, brigades/groups and individuals, and raise the profile of this important role.

After successful completion of the course, delegates will be awarded with two modules from Cert II in Public Safety (Firefighting Operations), with subjects ranging from Leadership, Raising Issues and Networking, to Decision Making, Managing Issues and Problem Solving.

Once under way, the program will help Brigade delegates be more involved in local and wider issues, and help District Councils with their succession planning.

### Presumptive Legislation

The need for presumptive legislation to give firefighters fairer and simpler access to cancer compensation remains unresolved in Victoria, but VFBV and Brigades have continued to engage with Members of Parliament on:

- Its importance to volunteers
- that it must list the 12 cancers and years of service requirements as appear in Federal and other States' legislation
- that it must treat career and volunteer firefighters equally, and
- that it include firefighters who have already been diagnosed.



VFBV provided input to a Parliamentary inquiry that led to Queensland passing presumptive legislation that meets the standard set by the South Australian legislation, treating career and volunteer firefighters equally and naming the same 12 cancers and years of service requirements as appear Federal and other States' legislation. Western Australia has since introduced a Bill to provide similar coverage for WA volunteers.

The Victorian Government has committed to introducing presumptive legislation for career and volunteer firefighters, and VFBV and volunteers are working with Members of Parliament to ensure it meets the current standard set by the legislation now in force, in Queensland and South Australia.

### EM Volunteer Statement

VFBV and volunteers took an active role in contributing improvements to the draft Emergency Management Volunteer Statement for Victoria ahead of its successful introduction during the year.

The Statement is a commitment between the Government, agencies and emergency volunteers. As stated by Minister Jane Garrett and EM Commissioner Craig Lapsley the Statement strengthens and complements the CFA Volunteer Charter.

VFBV volunteer feedback included a strong theme that the Statement's value relies on the level of effort put into ensuring the words are put into action, and many volunteers asked how the Statement's achievements would be measured and whether there would be opportunities to raise any concerns.

VFBV sees it as a positive and reinforcing commitment by the Victorian Government and Emergency Management Sector to consult and engage with volunteers in emergency management on matters that affect them.

### Regional BASOs

With CFA appointing Regional BASOs to implement parts of the Volunteer Support Program, the VFBV/CFA Joint Training Committee this year highlighted the importance of the original BASO program and the vital need to continue their direct support to brigades.

BASOs remain one of the most trusted and respected resources CFA can provide to assist and support brigades with their ever increasing administrative and logistical workloads.

This year, VFBV represented volunteers before a number of official inquiries, Parliamentary Committees and reviews, including the State Government's Fire Services Review, the Parliamentary Inquiry into Fiskville and the Queensland Parliamentary inquiry that led to the introduction of its firefighters' cancer law.

The preparation of the submissions, briefings and formal evidence involved hundreds of hours of research and consultation with volunteers, feedback from our 21 District Councils from around the state, local workshops, and reference to the submissions made by brigades and individual volunteers.

Our work on the Fire Services Review began with a workshop of the entire VFBV State Council that set the guidelines for our submission. We also provided the Review with copies of our submissions to:

- The Victorian Bushfires Royal Commission (VBRC)
- The Jones Inquiry into the Effect of Arrangements made by CFA on its Volunteers
- The Victorian Auditor General's Office (VAGO) Report, Managing Emergency Services Volunteers



- The 2008 Lewis Report on the Processes to Select New Personal Protective Clothing for Victorian Firefighters
- The Victorian Government's Green Paper titled Towards a More Disaster Resilient and Safer Victoria
- Victoria's Fire Services Property Levy Options Paper

The final report of the 2014 VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey provided important evidence from a volunteer's perspective, and we provided summaries in writing to all Members of the Victorian Parliament. VFBV also provided regular updates to volunteers via email, our website and their State and District Council representatives.

VFBV officials gave evidence to the Parliamentary Inquiry into Fiskville, VFBV has had face-to-face meetings with successive Emergency Services Ministers and Shadow Ministers on a variety of issues, and local VFBV Delegates have done the same with local MPs in their Districts.

A lot of work, at the VFBV office, in our Board, State and District Council meetings and other forums around the state, and at brigade level, goes into making sure that VFBV, as the voice of the volunteers, is heard whenever decisions that may affect the welfare and efficiency of volunteers are to be made.

### VFBV support at the local level

Our team of VFBV Support Officers work directly with brigades and the elected volunteer representatives of each VFBV District Council. They provide technical assistance and hands on support in each of CFA's five Regions. The Support Officers are also an important addition to VFBV's network of constant feedback from volunteers, brigades, District Councils and CFA District Planning Committees.


The Support Officers are all experienced CFA volunteers in roles as Captains, Lieutenants and at Group level, and each one also works on statewide projects in support of volunteers.

This year, the VFBV Support Officers have worked on initiatives, issues and projects including:

- VFBV Leadership Program coordination of this successful volunteer scholarship program
- VFBV Multi Agency Youth Network providing a local presence and networking with other emergency volunteer agencies as VFBV develops this new initiative in each District
- VFBV Volunteer Welfare & Efficiency Survey local promotion of the survey now used by VFBV, CFA, Emergency Management Victoria and the State Government as a source of volunteer opinion and feedback
- Networking helping District Council Secretaries to build more effective contact systems and networks for information and volunteer feedback at the local level
- Brigade Delegate support mentoring the new and assisting the experienced brigade representatives
- VFBV Volunteer Welfare Fund providing a local contact for confidential assistance to volunteers in need
- Organising VFBV and VFBV/CFA volunteer committees and working groups, providing support to volunteer representatives including research and information, and liaising with CFA on volunteer feedback and welfare matters

VFBV's work to promote the professionalism and contribution of volunteers has become increasingly sophisticated, with communication of positive messaging through the volunteers themselves, local media and online.

There are multiple channels through which the association propagates messages about volunteers' professional levels of training, 24/7 response, local knowledge, operational and non-operational roles, diversity, CFA's role as a volunteer based and fully integrated emergency service, and its surge capacity, the ability to call on tens of thousands of trained, experienced firefighters at short notice anywhere in the state.




Throughout the year, VFBV assisted brigades in gaining local publicity to support fundraising and recruiting, carrying messages of volunteer professionalism and service to the community.

VFBV provided a local publicity kit to over 60 brigades,

provided training and assistance to numerous brigades, and the promotion of these messages is built into the VFBV Leadership Scholarship Program, support to Brigades applying for Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) grants, training for VFBV District Council members, and support to Brigades engaging their Members of Parliament and other community leaders on local issues.

VFBV this year launched a cleverly designed animated video that shows the public in simple terms how Brigades across the state contribute to CFA's great volunteer surge capacity. The video was provided to CFA volunteer representatives around the State and posted online.



The video was an immediate success, with more than 50,000 views online, many through the actions of individual Facebook users who shared it on their own pages.

And while the animated video was achieving success with the public, VFBV was working with the University of Melbourne's Centre for Disaster Management and Public Safety on an evidence based, computer-generated time lapse video that visually displays CFA's huge volunteer surge capacity.

The time lapse video shows incidents and crews responding from all parts of the state, and reveals the vital role that thousands of CFA volunteers in Brigades based in the greater Melbourne area have in providing front line crews to major incidents across the state.



With the computer generated elements sourced from CFA incident reports, the video is another aid to demonstrate to the public and community decision makers how essential CFA volunteers are for Victoria's safety and building community resilience.

More than 7,000 supporters turned out to see 200 teams providing spectacular entertainment at the 2016 VFBV Urban and Rural State Championships.

Maryvale returned to the winners' circle at the Urban Seniors championship, and home team Tatura dominated the Urban Juniors.

Dunrobin/Nangeela took the senior honours at the rural championships and Springhurst came out on top in a nail biting finish at the rural junior championships.

VFBV sincerely thanks all the participating Brigades, teams, competitors and thousands of spectators for their support and attendance. The host committees at Mildura, Colac and Tatura again made a success of the huge task of running the events, and VFBV would also like to thank the municipal councils in the host towns for their support and many individual volunteers who helped out.

For all of our State Championships events, VFBV wishes to thank CFA and staff for their support, particularly the District Mechanical Staff and Tower Overseers. VFBV also extends its appreciation to major sponsors Hino for their generous support for volunteer championships, and the many other sponsors and trophy donors. Their support is an appreciable addition to these, the major social and sporting events in the volunteers' year.



### **Urban Championships**

Maryvale took the honours as Champion Brigade at the 2016 VFBV Urban Championships at Mildura, having last taken the title in 2011.

Sixty-one teams and a crowd of 3,500 enjoyed good weather and the experienced local committee's preparations were rewarded with a smoothly run event.

Maryvale achieved eight wins and several placings, dominating the first two days of the championships, for the Brigade's 15th state title and one of its most emphatic wins.

Werribee won B Section with sheer consistency – they achieved one win and four placings – and Whittlesea won a closely contested C Section by a small margin from second placed Stanhope.

### 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial statement prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (VIC) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. The board has determined that the not-for-profit Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The financial report is aggregated to include the numbers of Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria Inc. and Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria Welfare Fund.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

### (a) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997. Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria Inc and Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria Welfare Fund are registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.

### (b) Plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

### (c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of income and expenditure and other comprehensive income.

### (d) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting year. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

### e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

### (f) Revenue and other income

The Association recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured, it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the entity and specific criteria have been met for each of Volunteer Fire Brigades Victoria Inc's activities as discussed below.

Non-reciprocal grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receint

Interest income is mainly on interest-bearing cash and cash equivalent balances. Interest income is recognised on an accurals basis

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received

Merchandise revenue is recognised when significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods are transferred out by the entity.

Affiliation fees are recognised as income in the year the fees are earned.

Championship revenue are recognised when the event has occurred.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST)

### (g) Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

### (h) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

### (i) Financial assets

Held-to-maturity investments

Held to maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the Association's intention to hold these investments to maturity.

### (j) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.
