Susan has been part of Diggers Rest, Milltown and for the past 10 years Hamilton brigades and says she has grown from the experience.

While she is now heavily involved with the Hamilton fire Brigade junior program and has helped with fund-raising over the years, Susan says being an active firefighter was always what she wanted to do.

Susan's support for volunteers extends to her work as a regional administration officer for the SES.

She says she is "very humbled" by the CFA award. "We don't do it for the recognition. The Hamilton brigade has taught me so much and given me confidence to grow and believe in myself."

Winners of the Living the Values award have and continue to exemplify CFA values, promoting safety at all times, showing respect, empathy and understanding, act with

integrity, honesty and fairness and work collaboratively, maintaining open communication while adapting to change.

Other Hamilton region volunteers recognised in the Spirit of CFA awards included Steven Lewis from the Dundas Group who won the Excellence in Sustainability Planning award, and Wayne Munro, of Merino, who was commended in the same category.
